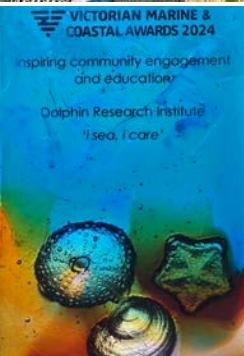

## DRI RESEARCH UPDATE: POKE HAS A NEW CALF!

Tracking calf survival is a crucial part of DRI Research and also the most challenging. We require multiple images of close mother-calf pairing before concluding the calf belongs to a particular adult. The image shows a dolphin called Poke, taken on 30 July, and the size of the calf and multiple images of this pairing lead to the conclusion it was born in mid-July and is certainly Poke's calf.

Tracking calves requires minute attention to marks from teeth rakings on their skin caused by other dolphins. These fade but are replaced by new marks, so regular surveys are crucial to follow the success of mother dolphins and their calves. Poke is #2 in the Port Phillip Common Dolphin Catalogue, and she has been seen nearly every year since 2005, with her latest calf being her seventh! Some calves have become parents to the third generation in Port Phillip. This knowledge is crucial to understanding the success of dolphin communities and the health of their environment.
